All old time musicians know of Dr. Doug's prowess, but this is the first time I have seen him perform on bones and blues harp. Wow! (BTW, Doug, when you can play a set of bones in both hands you will be a real Appalachian percussionist! I have tried and it ain't easy!) As good a musician as Doug is, he is surrounded by college graduates with music degrees in this band. Most of us are just "hit or miss," learn the hard way by ear, pickers, but not this bunch. That is why their harmonies are so tight and their instrumentals are right on. They don't play bluegrass, but we always have room for a really talented traditional acoustic group to lend their music to one of our showcases. Herb Ellis had died at the age of 88

Jazz guitar great, Herb Ellis has died at his home in Los Angeles. He was a devotee of the style of Charlie Christian, who pioneered the guitar in the big bands of the swing era and invented the first guitar pickup. He was part of a trio formed while playing in the Jimmy Dorsey band that wrote Detour Ahead which was recorded by the legendary Billie Holiday. He was a member of the Oscar Peterson trio, which included Ray Brown on bass with Peterson at the piano. A very notable jazz guitar album was recorded with other guitar giants, Barney Kessel and Charlie Byrd in the group [Great Guitars](#), which also performed concerts in many countries. Herb Ellis was 88.

WAY BACK WHEN . . .

About seventeen years ago my wife and I, with our 13 year old daughter, drove to Columbus for Aaron Strange's "Musician's Rendevous." I had been having fun building homemade instruments and I had a guitar and my daughter, Loy, a fiddle. We stopped near a group of jamming musicians and listened for a few minutes. There was a young fellow I had not seen before and he was struggling a bit with a fiddle. We wandered down and joined them and after a few more tunes, Wayne Long, packed up his banjo and left. Then the young guy, Bob Massey, went to his car and came back with a banjo. He proceeded to play some really good sounding banjo rolls and I was quite impressed, as Wayne was the only Scruggs style player I had heard in this area. Bob also had a nice Martin guitar and with his wife, Wanda, sang some great duets in the high, lonesome bluegrass style. Along the way he told me he had "been trying for two years to get a bluegrass club started in Billings." I told him I could sure help with that. We later got together a few times and laid out what we needed to do. Bob was the originator and musician, while I became the facilitator to get the details done to make it happen. That was when and how the conception of the bluegrass association in Billings occurred.

BLUE GRASS RECIPES

The following recipes are from the "Bluegrass Music Cookbook," by Penny Parsons, Ken Beck, and Jim Clark, John F. Blair, publisher, Winston-Salem, North Carolina, copyright 1977. This little essay is written by Thomas Goldsmith and gives you a "flavor" of this book:

"A FEAST HERE TONIGHT, TASTE THE FLAVOR OF BLUEGRASS"

So you've got a bunch of bluegrassers over for dinner. Wade through the sea of pickers in the kitchen and get going early. "Bile 'Em Cabbage Down" and don't forget to turn the hoecakes 'round neither. Start the "Country Ham and Red Gravy." Turn on the skillet for "Short'nin Bread." Your choice of flour is "Martha White." Jaw awhile with "Angeline the Baker" to make sure our biscuits have that "Southern Flavor." Get someone "Shucking the Corn." "Hot corn, Cold Corn"! You decide. Get big ideas when the fiddles play "Chicken Reel" and "Dill Pickle Rag." Remember that it's "Peach Pickin' Time in Georgia." and fix it all with "Sugar Coated Love."

Now go out to the patch and pick you a "Watermelon Hanging on the Vine," while keeping an eye out for "Blackberry Blossom." Then set up the picnic table; you've been "Singing All Day," and it's time for "Dinner on the Ground." Somebody wake up Paw; we can't start without "Father's Table Grace."

Wind up your feast with ice cream, but don't eat too much and get the "Rocky Road Blues."

Here's the hard part: keep those musicians away from the "Good Old Mountain Dew." A "Little Glass of Wine" might do the trick instead."

All recipes in this book are attributed to bluegrass musicians. Most are genuine, but a few are "spoofs." Following is one of each.

BACK PORCH BARBECUE PORK RIBS

FIXINS: 1 pack Caesar salad dressing mix, ½ cup olive oil, 1 T. lemon juice, 1 pound boneless country-style pork ribs, garlic salt, Parmesan cheese grated. Any kind of outdoor grill.

Mix the dressing pack, olive oil, and lemon juice together. Place the ribs in this marinade overnight in the refrigerator. Place on the hot grill and sprinkle on a little garlic salt to taste. When done, sprinkle with Parmesan cheese and let set for 5 minutes on the grill, covered. This is some good eatin'. Don't be afraid to fire up your grill in the winter either. Makes 2 to 4 servings.

Don Reno, The Reno Brothers Band (Ed. Note: sons of banjo great, Don Reno of Reno and Smiley fame.)

SLADE'S ROASTED ROADKILL

A favorite at the EAT CAFÉ in Wyoming, Montana. Run over one armadillo or possum on the highway. Clean it and put it on the engine of your car. Drive 80 mph for 50 miles. Get out and turn the possum (or armadillo) over and drive another 50 miles at 80 mph. Then your possum or armadillo will be done and you can have dinner. Cooking time will vary depending on whether you have a 4 cylinder, 6, or V8.

Slade of Red Knuckles and the Trail Blazers (Ed. Note: aka, Tim O'Brien and Hot Rize, a good bluegrass band. They would come out for an encore with electric instruments and do old Honky Tonk standards as Red Knuckles and the Trailblazers).
